MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The following Management Discussion & Analysis (“MD&A”) prepared as of May 13, 2013, should be read in conjunction with DHX Media Ltd.’s (the “Company” or “DHX”) unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements and accompanying notes for the three and nine months ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, as well as the Company’s latest annual MD&A (“2012 Annual MD&A”) and audited consolidated financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 (as found on www.sedar.com or on DHX’s website at www.dhxmedia.com). The unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements and accompanying notes for the three and nine months ended March 31, 2013 and 2012 have been prepared in accordance with international financial reporting standards (“IFRS”).

The Company’s auditors, Pricewaterhouse Coopers LLP, have not reviewed the unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements and accompanying notes for the three and nine months ended March 31, 2013 and 2012.

DHX is a public company incorporated under the Canadian Business Corporations Act whose common shares are traded on the Toronto Stock Exchange (“TSX”) admitted on May 19, 2006 (symbol DHX). Additional information relating to the Company can be found on its website at www.dhxmedia.com or on SEDAR at www.sedar.com.

The Company prepares its financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles as set out in the CICA Handbook. In 2010, the CICA Handbook was revised to incorporate IFRS, and require publicly accountable enterprises to apply such standards effective for years beginning on or after January 1, 2011. Accordingly, the Company commenced reporting on this basis in its unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements for the first quarter of 2012 (three months ended September 30, 2011).

As a result of the adoption of IFRS, certain trends in operating results presented under CGAAP may no longer be applicable under IFRS. In particular, the accounting for overall consolidation, share-based compensation, business combinations, cumulative translation adjustment, withholding taxes payable, and deferred income taxes are significantly impacted by the changeover to IFRS – refer to “Accounting Policies and Transition to IFRS” section of the 2012 Annual MD&A (found on www.sedar.com or on DHX’s website at www.dhxmedia.com for additional information).

Figures in this MD&A are shown as millions (for example, \$100,000 is shown as \$0.10 million) and are approximate and have been rounded to the nearest ten thousand.

Business of the Company

DHX is a leading independent supplier, distributor, and licensor of television and film productions. The Company was originally the result of the combination of The Halifax Film Company Limited (“**Halifax Film**”) and Decode Entertainment Inc. (“**Decode**”) during Fiscal 2006 and at the time of initial public offering. Since that time DHX has added on December 4, 2007 Studio B Productions (“**Studio B**”), on July 20, 2008 imX Communications Inc. (“**imX**”), on September 14, 2010 Wildbrain Entertainment Inc. (“**DHX Wildbrain**”), and on October 22, 2012 the business of Cookie Jar Entertainment (“**DHX Cookie Jar**”).

The Company produces, distributes, and exploits the rights for television and film programming. DHX’s primary focus is on children’s, youth, and family (collectively “**Children’s and Family**”) productions because of the international sales potential and longer-term and multiple revenue streams that this genre of programming provides. Children’s and Family programming travels across cultures more easily than other genres and can therefore be sold into numerous markets, typically has a longer lifespan than other genres, and can be leveraged for merchandising and licensing revenues.

DHX’s content library includes over 8,500 half hours of award winning programming. DHX is recognized for brands such as *Caillou*, *Richard Scarry’s Busytown Mysteries*, *Inspector Gadget*, *Johnny Test*, *Animal Mechanicals*, *Kid vs. Kat*, *Super WHY!*, *Rastamouse*, and *Yo Gabba Gabba!*. The Company also provides programming for Cookie Jar TV, the weekend morning block on CBS. DHX’s European licensing brand representation agency business, Copyright Promotions Licensing Group, (“**CPLG**”), represents numerous entertainment, sport and design brands. The Company’s prime-time production slate also includes notable achievements in the comedy genre, including the award-winning Canadian prime-time comedy series *This Hour Has 22 Minutes*, which is produced for the CBC and has just been renewed for its 21st season. DHX has offices in Toronto, Los Angeles, Vancouver, Halifax, London, Paris, Lisbon, Barcelona, Milan, Munich, and the Netherlands.

Revenue Model

The Company earns revenues primarily from six categories: 1) proprietary production, which includes Canadian and other rights proprietary programs, 2) distribution (including digital distribution) of its proprietary and third party acquired titles, 3) producer and service fees, which includes production services for third parties, 4) merchandising and licensing (“**M&L**”) for owned brands (including, among others, *Yo Gabba Gabba*, *Caillou*, *Richard Scarry’s Busytown Mysteries*, *Johnny Test*, and *Rastamouse*) and music and royalties, 5) M&L represented which includes the Company’s newly acquired CPLG (as part of the purchase of Cookie Jar Entertainment on October 22, 2012 (“**Cookie Jar Transaction**”), please see Cookie Jar Acquisition section of this MD&A for further details), and 6) other revenues which includes rental of studios and office facilities and new media revenue.

The Company is able to generate revenue from productions by licensing its initial broadcast rights and pre-licensing of territories for its programs. Production revenues include the initial broadcast license revenues and any pre-sales or distribution advances included in the initial financing of the production of a film and television program. Once a production is completed and delivered, the program is included in the Company’s library of film and television programming. Further revenue from exploitation of the program is included in distribution revenue if it relates to television licences and in M&L if it relates to royalties or revenues generated from non-television licenses (including home entertainment). The Company also generates revenue from programs in which it retains Canadian and other limited participation rights and, in certain instances, from production services for productions whose copyright is owned by third parties.

Production Revenue

The Company derives proprietary production revenues, which includes other proprietary titles with Canadian and other rights, from the grant of initial broadcast rights for the initial showing of commissioned productions and pre-licensing of territories. These fees are typically collected partially upon commissioning of a production, during production, and finally once a completed production is delivered for broadcast, and at some point in time after delivery as a holdback (See note 3 of the audited consolidated financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 for details on revenue recognition).

Distribution Revenue

The Company is able to retain or obtain the ownership rights to its proprietary, other proprietary titles, and third party acquired titles, which permits the Company to generate further revenues from the distribution of the Company’s productions. In addition to generating revenues from the sale of initial broadcast rights, the Company is able to concurrently generate revenues from the sale of broadcast rights in other jurisdictions and on other platforms (such as DVD, home entertainment, and digital platforms) for specified periods of time. Distribution revenue also includes theatrical and other revenues generated on its feature films and movies of the week (“**MOW’s**”).

Producer and Service Fee Revenue

Producer and service fee revenue includes revenue accounted for using the percentage of completion method for revenues for service and corporate overhead fees earned for producing television shows and MOW's.

M&L-Owned, Music and Other Royalties

M&L for owned brands and other various licensing royalties includes revenues from DHX's proprietary brands (among others, *Yo Gabba Gabba!*, *Rastamouse*, *Caillou*, and *Johnny Test*) and revenues earned on music publishing rights, music retransmission rights, and other royalties.

M&L-Represented

M&L-represented includes revenues earned from CPLG. CPLG is an agency business (acquired as part of the Cookie Jar acquisition) based in Europe that earns commissions on M&L from representing independently owned brands from film studios and other third parties.

Other Revenue

Other revenue includes new media revenues earned on new media and interactive games and apps, and revenue earned from rental of studios, equipment, and office facilities.

Results for the nine months ended March 31, 2013 (“Nine Months 2013”) compared to the nine months ended March 31, 2012 (“Nine Months 2012”)

Revenues

Revenues for Nine Months 2013 were \$71.10 million, up 22% from \$58.24 million for Nine Months 2012. The increase in Nine Months 2013 was generally due to significantly higher distribution revenue (generally driven by the proliferation of new digital buyers and the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar) and the increase in M&L-owned (driven by an increase in *Yo Gabba Gabba! Live!* shows) and was offset somewhat by decreases in production revenue (proprietary and producer and service fee revenue).

Proprietary production revenues: Proprietary production revenues for Nine Months 2013 were \$9.37 million, a decrease of 18% compared to \$11.37 million for Nine Months 2012. The overall decrease was mainly due to scheduled timing of deliveries (see delivery chart below for further details).

For Nine Months 2013, the Company added 64 half-hours to the library. The breakdown for Nine Months 2013 for production, which generated \$9.37 million of proprietary film and television program production revenue, is 41.0 half-hours versus the 74.0 half-hours for Nine Months 2012, where the programs have been delivered and the license periods have commenced and 23.0 half-hours in intellectual property (“IP”) rights for third party produced titles (29.0 half-hours in Nine Months 2012). Nine Months 2013 proprietary deliveries were generally in line with scheduled deliveries and Management’s expectations.

DHX continued to strategically target third party produced titles for IP rights. As noted above, for Nine Months 2013, the Company added to the library 2.0 half-hours for *Deadtime Stories*, 13.0 half-hours for *Rastamouse*, and 8.0 half-hours for *She-Zow*. For Nine Months 2012, the Company added 10.0 half-hours for *Ha Ha Hairies*, 6.0 half-hours for *How to be Indie*, and 13.0 half-hours for *Rastamouse*.

The breakdown for content library deliveries (including proprietary deliveries and deliveries on IP rights for third party produced titles) and dollar value subtotals per category for Nine Months 2013 and Nine Months 2012 was as follows:

Producer and service fee revenues: For Nine Months 2013, the Company earned \$16.56 million for producer and service fee revenues, a decrease of 33% versus the \$24.57 million for Nine Months 2012. This was due to Management's decision, coming out of its integration with DHX Cookie Jar and specifically to lower SG&A on less profitable parts of the business, to wind down its lower margin LA service studio and focus on its higher margin animation studios in Canada. The transition is proving out in higher gross margins for the category (as evidenced by a 36% margin for Nine Months 2013) but is taking slightly longer than expected (1-2 quarters). This, along with the unexpected scheduling delays in two productions, has resulted in producer and service fee revenues for Nine Months 2013 being somewhat off expectations.

Distribution revenues: For Nine Months 2013, distribution revenues were up 247% to \$17.52 million from \$5.05 million for Nine Months 2012, primarily due to the proliferation of new digital customers and the addition of DHX Cookie Jar. For the Nine Months 2013, the Company closed significant deals, among others previously announced, as follows: Daily Motion, Global Movie Pte Ltd., Amazon EU SARL, Super RTL Disney, Netflix, Inc., and Kidoodle.TV.

M&L-owned (including music and other royalty revenues): For Nine Months 2013, M&L-owned increased 43% (23% organic and 20% from DHX Cookie Jar) to \$18.73 million (Nine Months 2012-\$13.06 million). For Nine Months 2013, *Yo Gabba Gabba! Live!* show revenue generated \$10.00 million as compared to Nine Months 2012 of \$7.26 million. For Nine Months 2013, other *Yo Gabba Gabba!* M&L revenue was \$3.61 million, in line with the \$3.60 million for Nine Months 2012. The remaining M&L-owned was \$5.12 million (\$2.71 million relating to DHX Cookie Jar), up 133% from \$2.20 million for Nine Months 2012.

M&L-represented revenues: For Nine Months 2013, M&L-represented revenue was \$4.84 million from CPLG (acquired as part of the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar) (Nine Months 2012-nil) which only included 160 days of activity.

Rental and new media revenues: For Nine Months 2013, new media revenues decreased 2% to \$3.89 million (Nine Months 2012-\$3.97 million) based primarily on scheduled timing of certain UMIGO deliverables. For Nine Months 2013, rental revenues were \$0.18 million, down 18% from Nine Months 2012 of \$0.22 million, as a result of lower rental revenues of studio and office facilities to third parties of the Company's Toronto office.

Gross Margin

Gross margin for Nine Months 2013 was \$33.82 million, an increase in absolute dollars of 79% compared to \$18.90 million for Nine Months 2012. DHX is pleased to report the overall gross margin for Nine Months 2013 at 48% of revenue was above the high end of Management's expectations, driven mainly by strong margins on production (proprietary and service), new digital distribution deals, and M&L revenues. Gross margin for Nine Months 2013 was calculated as revenues of \$71.10 million less direct production costs and amortization of investment in film of \$34.31 million and less \$2.97 million amortization of the acquired DHX Cookie Jar library (Nine Months 2012-\$58.24 million less \$39.34 million and less nil, respectively).

For Nine Months 2013, the margins for each revenue category in absolute dollars and as a margin percentage were as follows: production revenue margin of \$3.93 million or 42%, net producer and service fee revenue margin of \$6.02 million or 36%, distribution revenue margin of \$9.08 million or 52% (\$7.60 million or 43% when \$1.49 million for the amortization of acquired libraries is removed), M&L-owned margin was \$9.43 million or 50%, M&L-represented revenue margin at \$4.84 million or 100%, new media margin at \$0.34 million or 9%, and rental revenue margin of \$0.18 million or 100%.

Production margin at 42%, based on product delivery mix, was at the high end of Management's expectations. Producer and service fee margins can vary greatly and at 36% (as compared to 21% for Nine Months 2012) is at the high end of Management's expectations and a testament to Management's decision to shift its service work to its animation studios in Canada. Distribution margin can fluctuate greatly from title-to-title and at 52% is at the midpoint of Management's expectations.

Operating Expenses (Income)

SG&A

SG&A costs for Nine Months 2013 were up 88% at \$22.38 million compared to \$11.91 million for Nine Months 2012. The increase in SG&A is due to the inclusion of \$6.64 million for DHX Cookie Jar which was acquired on October 22, 2012, a non-cash charge of \$0.98 million for share-based compensation (Nine Months 2012-\$0.38 million), which included a one-time charge of \$0.39 million related to warrants granted in connection with the Cookie Jar Acquisition, and \$3.51 million for severance and workforce harmonization costs related to the integration of DHX Cookie Jar.

Amortization

For Nine Months 2013, amortization was up 87% to \$4.80 million (Nine Months 2012-\$2.57 million). For Nine Months 2013, the amortization of acquired libraries was up 144% to \$1.49 million (the balance of amortization of acquired library of \$2.97 million (Nine Months 2012-nil) is shown as a reduction of gross margin noted above) primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition (Nine Months 2012-\$0.61 million). This amortization relates to the library titles that have a maximum 20 year life for

amortization purposes, have minimal ongoing cash costs associated with selling, and are viewed as long-term assets. For Nine Months 2013, amortization of PP&E was up 12% to \$1.49 million primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition, offset by sale of the Halifax building (Nine Months 2012-\$1.33 million). For Nine Months 2013, amortization of intangible assets was up 190% to \$1.83 million primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition (Nine Months 2012-\$0.63 million).

Development Expenses and Other One-time Charges

During Nine Months 2013, development expenses were up 305% to \$1.78 million (Nine Months 2012-\$0.44 million) and include \$1.50 million (Nine Months 2012-nil) of one-time costs on terminated or abandoned development contracts as a result of the integration subsequent to the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar.

Acquisition Costs

During Nine Months 2013, Cookie Jar acquisition costs were \$1.72 million (Nine Months 2012-nil).

Impairment in Value of Investment in Film and Television Programs

During Nine Months 2013, the Company did not record an impairment in value of investments in film and television programs (Nine Months 2012 - \$0.14 million).

Share of Loss of Associates

For Nine Months 2013, the Company recorded its share of loss of associates of \$0.17 million for its investment in Tribal Nova (Q1 2012-\$0.08 million). For Nine Months 2013, the \$0.17 million loss was made up of \$0.18 million in amortization of Tribal Nova intangibles and an income pickup of \$0.01 million for the Company's share of Tribal Nova (see "Sale of Interest in Tribal Nova" section of this MD&A for further details).

Finance Income and Expenses

For Nine Months 2013, the Company recorded net finance expense of \$1.88 million versus \$0.02 million net finance income for Nine Months 2012. Nine Months 2013 net finance expense consists of \$0.75 million for finance costs on long-term debt and capital leases (Nine Months 2012-\$0.07 million), \$0.34 million for finance and bank charges including interest on the revolving line of credit (Nine Months 2012-\$0.09 million), interest accreted from deferred financing fees of \$0.30 million (Nine Months 2012-nil), a foreign exchange loss of \$0.67 million (Nine Months 2012-\$0.01 million foreign exchange gain), and offset by finance income of \$0.18 million (Nine Months 2012-\$0.17 million).

EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA

For Nine Months 2013, EBITDA was \$8.81 million, up \$1.44 million or 20% versus \$7.37 million for Nine Months 2012. For Nine Months 2013, Adjusted EBITDA was \$15.93 million, up \$8.56 million or 116% over \$7.37 million for Nine Months 2012. For Nine Months 2013, Adjusted EBITDA includes add backs for one-time charges, noted herein, relating to the Cookie Jar Acquisition totalling \$7.12 million ("**CJ One-time Charges**"), consisting of \$0.39 million for warrants granted shown in share-based compensation in SG&A, \$3.51 million for severance costs shown in salaries and employee benefits in SG&A, \$1.50 million for terminated or abandoned development contracts shown in development expenses and other, and \$1.72 million for acquisition costs.

Income Taxes

Income tax for Nine Months 2013 was an expense of \$1.03 million (Nine Months 2012-\$1.09 million expense) made up of \$1.17 million expense (Nine Months 2012-\$1.24 million expense) for current income tax, and deferred income tax recovery of \$0.14 million (Nine Months 2012-\$0.15 million recovery).

Net Income (Loss) and Comprehensive Income (Loss)

For Nine Months 2013 stated net income was \$1.12 million, compared to \$2.70 million income for Nine Months 2012, or a decrease of \$1.58 million in absolute dollars or 59%. For Nine Months 2013, net income normalized for CJ One-time Charges of \$4.77 million (net of tax effect of \$2.35 million) was \$5.89 million, (up 118% or \$0.07 adjusted basic and adjusted diluted earnings per share) as compared to \$2.70 million net income (\$0.05 basic and diluted earnings per share) for Nine Months 2012.

Comprehensive income for Nine Months 2013 was \$0.14 million, compared to \$2.97 million income for Nine Months 2012, or a decrease of \$2.83 million in absolute dollars, made up of a decrease in cumulative translation adjustments of \$1.14 million and a decrease in net income of \$1.58 million, a decrease in fair value of available-for-sale investments of \$0.14 million, offset by an increase in realized gain on available for sale assets of \$0.03 million.

Results for the three months ended March 31, 2013 (“Q3 2013”) compared to the three months ended March 31, 2012 (“Q3 2012”)

Revenues

Revenues for Q3 2013 were \$31.23 million, up 88% from \$16.62 million for Q3 2012. The increase in Q3 2013 was due to a significant increase in distribution revenue (driven by a proliferation of new digital buyers and the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar), an increase in proprietary production revenue and M&L-owned (driven by *Yo Gabba Gabba! Live!*), and offset somewhat by a reduction in producer and service fee revenue (driven by Management’s decision to wind down lower margin service work in its LA studio).

Proprietary production revenues: Proprietary production revenues for Q3 2013 were \$4.19 million, an increase of 86% compared to \$2.25 million for Q3 2012. The overall increase was mainly due to scheduled timing of deliveries (see delivery chart below for further details).

For Q3 2013, the Company added 28.0 half-hours to the library. The breakdown for Q3 2013 is 19.0 half-hours - \$4.19 million of proprietary film and television program production revenue versus the 28.0 half-hours for Q3 2012, where the programs have been delivered and the license periods have commenced for consolidated entities and 9.0 half-hours in intellectual property (“IP”) rights for third party produced titles (10.0 half-hours in Q3 2012). Q3 2013 proprietary deliveries were in line with scheduled deliveries and Management’s expectations.

DHX continued to strategically target third party produced titles for IP rights. As noted above, for Q3 2013, the Company added to the library 2.0 half-hours for *Deadtime Stories* and 7.0 half-hours for *She-Zow*. For Q3 2012, the Company added 10.0 half-hours for *Ha Ha Hairies*.

The breakdown for content library deliveries (including proprietary deliveries and deliveries on IP rights for third party produced titles) and dollar value subtotals per category for Q3 2013 and Q3 2012 was as follows:

Producer and service fee revenues: For Q3 2013, the Company earned \$3.89 million for producer and service fee revenues, a decrease of 53% versus the \$8.32 million for Q3 2012. This was due to Management's decision, coming out of its integration with DHX Cookie Jar and specifically to lower SG&A on less profitable parts of the business, to wind down its lower margin LA

service studio and focus on its higher margin animation studios in Canada. The transition is proving out in higher gross margins for the category (as evidenced by a 35% margin for Q3 2013 versus 25% for Q3 2012) but is taking slightly longer than expected (1-2 quarters). This, along with the unexpected scheduling delays in two productions, has resulted in producer and service fee revenues for Q3 2013 being somewhat off expectations.

Distribution revenues: For Q3 2013, Management is pleased to report distribution revenues were up 267% to \$6.94 million from \$1.89 million for Q3 2012, primarily due to the proliferation of new digital customers and the addition of DHX Cookie Jar. For Q3 2013, the Company closed significant deals, among others previously announced, as follows: Gaiam Vivendi Entertainment, Dish Network LLC, Viacom Media Networks, PBS, Daily Motion, Turner Broadcasting System Europe, and Kidoodle.TV.

M&L-owned (including music and other royalty revenues): For Q3 2013, Management was pleased that M&L-owned increased 244% to \$12.16 million (Q3 2012-\$3.54 million), ahead of expectations. For Q3 2013, there were 107 *Yo Gabba Gabba! Live!* shows generating \$7.72 million as compared to wrapping up the Fiscal 2012 tour and recording \$1.00 million in revenue for Q3 2012. For Q3 2013, other *Yo Gabba Gabba!* M&L was \$1.12 million, down 19% from \$1.38 million for Q3 2012. The remaining M&L-owned was \$3.32 million (\$2.06 million related to DHX Cookie Jar), up 186% as compared to \$1.16 million for Q3 2012.

M&L-represented revenues: For Q3 2013, M&L-represented revenue was \$2.76 million from CPLG (Q3 2012-nil) which was acquired as part of the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar.

New Media and Rental revenues: For Q3 2013, new media revenues increased 125% to \$1.24 million (Q3 2012-\$0.55 million) based primarily on scheduled timing of certain UMIGO deliverables. For Q3 2013, rental revenues were \$0.04 million, down 43% from Q3 2012 of \$0.07 million, as a result of the reduction of rental revenues of studio and office facilities to third parties of the Company's Toronto office.

Gross Margin

Gross margin for Q3 2013 was \$14.41 million, an increase in absolute dollars of 136% compared to \$6.12 million for Q3 2012. DHX is pleased to report the overall gross margin for Q3 2013 at 46% of revenue was above the high end of Management's expectations, driven by a strong quarter for margins on new digital distribution deals, proprietary production, producer and service fee, and M&L-owned revenues. Gross margin for Q3 2013 was calculated as revenues of \$31.23 million less direct production costs and amortization of investment in film of \$15.32 million and less \$1.50 million amortization of the acquired DHX Cookie Jar library (Q3 2012-\$16.62 million less \$10.50 million and less nil, respectively).

For Q3 2013, the margins for each revenue category in absolute dollars and as a margin percentage were as follows: production revenue margin of \$1.82 million or 43%, net producer and service fee revenue margin of \$1.35 million or 35%, distribution revenue margin of \$3.24 million or 47% (\$2.43 million or 55% when \$0.81 million for the amortization of acquired libraries is removed), M&L-owned margin was \$5.28 million or 43%, M&L-represented revenue margin was \$2.76 million or 100%, new media margin a reversal of \$0.08 million or 6%, and rental revenue margin of \$0.04 million or 100%.

Production margin at 43%, based on product delivery mix, was at the high end of Management's expectations. Producer and service fee margins can vary greatly and at 35% (as compared to 25% for Q3 2012) is at the high end of Management's expectations. Distribution margin can fluctuate greatly from title-to-title and at 47% is at the midpoint of Management's expectations.

Operating Expenses (Income)

SG&A

SG&A costs for Q3 2013 were up 120% at \$8.97 million compared to \$4.07 million for Q3 2012. The increase in SG&A in Q3 2013 is due to the inclusion of \$3.93 million (Q3 2012-nil) for DHX Cookie Jar which was acquired on October 22, 2012 and \$1.51 million (Q3 2012-nil) for severance and workforce harmonization costs related to the integration of DHX Cookie Jar.

Amortization

For Q3 2013, amortization was up 157% to \$2.24 million (Q3 2012-\$0.87 million). For Q3 2013, the amortization of acquired libraries was up 523% to \$0.81 million primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition (Q3 2012-\$0.13 million) (note-the balance of amortization of acquired library of \$1.49 million (Q3 2012-nil) is shown as a reduction of gross margin noted above). This amortization relates to the library titles that have a maximum 20 year life for amortization purposes, have minimal ongoing cash costs associated with selling, and are viewed as long-term assets. For Q3 2013, amortization of PP&E was up 4% to \$0.55 million primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition and offset by the sale of the Company's Halifax building (Q3 2012-\$0.53 million). For Q3 2013, amortization of intangible assets was up 319% to \$0.88 million primarily due to the Cookie Jar acquisition (Q3 2012-0.21 million).

Development Expenses and Other One-time Charges

During Q3 2013, development expenses were up 304% to \$0.93 million (Q3 2012-\$0.23 million), consisting of one-time costs on terminated or abandoned development contracts as a result of the integration subsequent to the acquisition of DHX Cookie Jar.

Acquisition Costs

During Q3 2013, Cookie Jar acquisition costs were \$0.35 million (Q3 2012-nil).

Share of Loss of Associates

For Q3 2013, the Company recorded its share of loss of associates of \$0.09 million for its investment in Tribal Nova (Q3 2012-\$0.05 million). For Q3 2013, the \$0.09 million loss was made up of \$0.06 million in amortization of Tribal Nova intangibles and a loss of \$0.03 million for the Company's share of Tribal Nova (see "Sale of Interest in Tribal Nova" section of this MD&A for further details).

Finance Income and Expenses

For Q3 2013, the Company recorded net finance expense of \$1.30 million versus \$0.09 million net finance expense for Q3 2012. Q3 2013 net finance expense consists of \$0.42 million for finance costs on long-term debt and capital leases (Q3 2012-\$0.02 million), \$0.11 million for finance and bank charges including interest on the revolving line of credit (Q3 2012-\$0.04 million), interest accreted on deferred financing fees of \$0.17 million (Q3 2012-nil), a foreign exchange loss of \$0.73 million (Q3 2012-\$0.08 million foreign exchange loss), and offset by finance income of \$0.13 million (Q3 2012-\$0.05 million).

EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA

For Q3 2013, EBITDA was \$4.42 million, up \$2.32 million or 110% versus \$2.10 million for Q3 2012. For Q3 2013, Adjusted EBITDA was \$7.21 million, up \$5.11 million or 243% over \$2.10 million for Q3 2012. For Q3 2013, Adjusted EBITDA includes add backs for one-time charges, noted herein, relating to the Cookie Jar Acquisition totalling \$2.79 million ("**Q3 2013 CJ One-time Charges**"), consisting of \$1.51 million, shown in salaries and employee benefits in SG&A, for severance costs, and \$0.93 million for terminated or abandoned development contracts, shown in development expenses and other, and \$0.35 million for acquisition costs.

Income Taxes

Income tax for Q3 2013 was an expense of \$0.72 million (Q3 2012-\$0.24 million expense) made up of \$1.52 million expense (Q3 2012-\$0.51 million expense) for current income tax, and deferred income tax recovery of \$0.80 million (Q3 2012-\$0.27 million recovery).

Net Income (Loss) and Comprehensive Income (Loss)

For Q3 2013 stated net income was \$0.91 million, compared to \$0.55 million income for Q3 2012, or an increase of \$0.36 million in absolute dollars or 65%. For Q3 2013, net income normalized for Q3 2013 CJ One-time Charges of \$1.82 million (net of tax effect of \$0.97 million) was \$2.73 million, (up 396% or \$0.03 adjusted basic and diluted earnings per share) as compared to \$0.55 million net income (\$0.01 basic and diluted earnings per share) for Q3 2012.

Comprehensive income for Q3 2013 was \$0.42 million, compared to \$0.23 million income for Q3 2012, or an increase of \$0.19 million in absolute dollars, made up of an increase in net income of \$0.36 million, and an increase in fair value of available-for-sale investments of \$0.06 million, and offset by a decrease in cumulative translation adjustments of \$0.23 million.

Changes in Cash

Cash at March 31, 2013 was \$20.28 million, as compared to \$14.96 million and \$19.17 million at December 31, 2012 and June 30, 2012 respectively. For the three month period ended March 31, 2013 the cash balance increased \$5.32 million when comparing it to the cash balance as at December 31, 2012.

For the nine months ended March 31, 2013 cash flows used in operating activities were \$8.17 million. Cash flows provided by operating activities were net income of \$1.12 million and adding back non-cash items of amortization of film and television programs, acquired library, PP&E, intangible assets, share of loss of associates, and share-based compensation of \$8.94 million, \$4.45 million, \$1.49 million, \$1.83 million, \$0.17 million, and \$0.98 million, respectively. Cash flows used in operating activities were \$0.79 million unrealized foreign exchange gain, \$1.05 million for realized net gain on disposal of the Company’s Halifax building and short-term investments, \$0.14 million for deferred income tax recovery, \$7.28 million for the net change in non-cash working capital balances related to operations, and \$17.89 million for net investments in film and television.

For the nine months ended March 31, 2013 cash flows from financing activities were \$6.82 million. Cash flows used in financing activities resulted from dividends paid of \$0.77 million, an increase in deferred financing fees of \$0.69 million, an increase in restricted cash of \$0.06 million, repayments of long-term debt and obligations under capital leases of \$63.62 million, and repayment of subordinated shareholder debt assumed on acquisitions of \$8.67 million. Cash flows from financing activities were provided by proceeds from issuance of common shares of \$17.33 million, proceeds from issuing of common shares related to employee share purchase plan and options of \$0.02 million, proceeds from bank indebtedness of \$7.34 million, proceeds from interim production financing of \$7.65 million, and proceeds from long-term debt of \$48.29 million.

For the nine months ended March 31, 2013 cash flows from investing activities were \$2.49 million. Cash flows from investing activities were provided by proceeds on short-term investments of \$3.29 million and proceeds on sale of property, plant and equipment of \$5.21 million. Cash flows used in investing activities were \$2.19 million for business acquisitions, acquisition of property, plant and equipment of \$1.42 million, net change in long-term receivables and payables of \$0.35 million, and decrease in long-term deferred revenue of \$2.05 million.

Working Capital

Working capital (“**Working Capital**”) represents the Company’s current assets less current liabilities. Working Capital increased by \$39.64 million as at March 31, 2013 versus June 30, 2012.

Based on the Company’s current revenue expectations for Fiscal 2013, which are based on contracted and expected production, distribution, M&L, and other revenue, the Company believes cash generated from operations and existing resources

will be sufficient to satisfy Working Capital needs for at least the next twelve months. Management believes the current Working Capital surplus totalling \$99.24 million is sufficient to execute its current business plan.

Pre-existing Royal Bank Revolving Master Credit Facility

On October 22, 2012, upon closing (“**Cookie Jar Closing**”) the Cookie Jar Acquisition (“**Cookie Jar Acquisition**”) (see Cookie Jar Acquisition section of this MD&A for further details) all the existing RBC facilities under the RBC Master Agreement were paid in full and replaced with the new Syndicated Master Credit Agreement (the “**Syndicated Master Credit Agreement**”).

New Syndicated Master Credit Agreement

Concurrently with the Cookie Jar Closing, DHX entered into a new credit facility with a syndicate of Canadian banks led by Royal Bank Capital Markets that replaced the existing indebtedness of DHX and Cookie Jar, other than production-specific financing obtained by DHX and Cookie Jar’s subsidiaries. The Syndicated Master Credit Agreement consists of two senior secured credit facilities (the “**Credit Facilities**”) in an aggregate principal amount of up to \$70 million, including a term loan credit facility in the aggregate amount of \$50 million (the “**Term Facility**”), fully drawn down on closing (March 31, 2013-\$47.68 million), and a revolving loan credit facility in the aggregate amount of up to \$20 million (the “**Revolving Facility**”) (\$5.5 million of which was drawn at the Cookie Jar Closing and \$10.0 million at March 31, 2013). The Term Facility was used to repay certain indebtedness of DHX and its subsidiaries, including certain indebtedness of Cookie Jar assumed as part of the Cookie Jar Acquisition, and to pay fees and expenses incurred in connection with the Cookie Jar Acquisition. The Revolving Facility is available for working capital and general corporate purposes.

DHX and certain of its subsidiaries as guarantors provided a first priority security interest in respect of all of the capital stock of the subsidiaries of DHX and the guarantors and all present and after-acquired real and personal property of DHX and the guarantors in favour of the lender as security for the Credit Facilities. The Term Facility will mature four years from the closing date of the Credit Facilities and is subject to annual amortization payments (as a percentage of the initial amount of the Term Facility) of (i) 7% in 2013, (ii) 8% in 2014, (iii) 12% in 2015 and (iv) 13% in 2016, all payable in equal quarterly installments in each case with the balance payable in full on the maturity date. The Revolving Facility is payable in full on the maturity date of the Term Facility.

Capital Management

The Company’s objectives when managing capital are to provide an adequate return to shareholders, safeguard its assets, maintain a competitive cost structure and continue as a going concern in order to pursue the development, production, distribution, and licensing of its film and television properties.

To facilitate the management of its capital structure, the Company prepares annual expenditure operating budgets that are updated as necessary depending on various factors, including industry conditions and operating cash flow. The annual and updated budgets are reviewed by the board of directors.

The Company monitors capital using a number of financial ratios, specifically, as at March 31, 2013, under the new Credit Facilities, including but not limited to:

- Leverage Ratio, defined as funded debt (the total of all obligations for borrowed money which bear interest or imputed interest (not including interim production financing), all capital lease obligations, and any contingent liabilities) (“**Funded Debt**”) to consolidated adjusted EBITDA (consolidated adjusted EBITDA (pro-forma last 12 months including DHX Cookie Jar) less foreign exchange gains or losses on intercompany debt, production-related EBITDA and one-time Cookie Jar acquisition costs); and
- The Fixed Charge Ratio, defined as consolidated adjusted EBITDA less current income taxes and unfunded capital expenditures to fixed charges (consolidated interest expense and scheduled principal payments on Funded Debt).

Outlook

The Company's March 31, 2013 balance sheet remains strong with in excess of \$20.0 million in cash on hand. Management continues to focus on its core strengths of developing, producing, distributing its 8,500 half-hour library, and licensing the best possible quality Children's and Family programs with goals of increasing cash flows from operations and profitability through existing production and distribution streams and emerging music and M&L opportunities. The Company is committed to growing its content library annually by a goal of 1-2% (approximately 75-150 half-hours) organically and through acquisitions of third party titles.

On October 22, 2012, DHX completed the Cookie Jar Acquisition and as such the following outlook has been revised to include expected results for both DHX (prior to the Cookie Jar Acquisition) and DHX Cookie Jar.

For Q4 2013, DHX's revised target for the category of production revenue (proprietary and producer and service fee) is \$12.5-18.0 million with a combined target gross margin of 20%-35% (Fiscal 2012-26% combined margin). The range for producer and service fee has come down as a result of a slightly slower than expected transition to our Canadian studios coming off Management's Q2 decision to wind down our LA studio. While this revenue has not gone away, it is expected to be pushed forward somewhat (1-2 quarters). Proprietary production is generally on track with our expected Fiscal 2013 target. DHX's combined proprietary pipeline continues to build and is now stronger as we have added 3-5 expected new shows in the coming 4-6 quarters from the Cookie Jar development slate. This pipeline includes, among others, *Dr. Dimensionpants!* (Season 1), *This Hour Has 22 Minutes* (Season 21), *Johnny Test* (Season 6), *Packages from Planet X* (Season 1), *Doozers* (Season 1), *Ella the Elephant* (Season 1), and *Satisfaction* (Season 1).

In addition, consistent with the Company's strategy to grow its content library, for Q4 2013, the Company expects to add 13-19 half-hours (note: approximately 65 half-hours contracted to be added over the next 12-18 months with offers out on more than 72 additional half-hours) for third party produced titles where the Company has significant IP rights. These include, among other titles, the hit series *Rastamouse*, *She-Zow*, and *Grandpa in my Pocket*, and now *Deadtime Stories* from DHX Cookie Jar. As such, for Q4 2013, DHX's revised target for the category of distribution (library) revenues is \$6-9 million.

For Q4 2013, DHX's revised target for M&L on owned brands (*Yo Gabba Gabba!*, *Rastamouse*, *Caillou*, *Richard Scarry's Busy Town Mysteries*, and *Johnny Test*) is from \$2-3.5 million. In addition, for Q4 2013, DHX's revised target for music and royalty revenue is \$1-2 million.

For Q4 2013, as a result of the Cookie Jar Acquisition, the Company's newly acquired European M&L brand representation group (CPLG) is targeting \$2.5-4 million in revenues for M&L represented. It is worth noting that because CPLG is a licensing agency business, there is very little direct cost of goods sold (historically 5-15%) and the majority of the expenses against this category are SG&A and are included in DHX's revised SG&A targets noted below.

For Q4 2013, new media revenue is targeted in the range of \$1-1.5 million including the property UMIGO and other revenues including rentals are expected to be in the range of \$0.15-\$0.25 million.

For Q4 2013, Management expects revised gross margins for each revenue category to range as follows: 20-40% for proprietary production, 30-40% for producer and service fee, 40-60% for distribution, 50-65% for owned M&L, 65-75% for music and royalty, 85-95% for M&L represented, 15-30% for new media, and 90-95% for rental.

For Q4 2013, DHX, now having generally achieved its run-rate synergy targets, expects SG&A to range from \$7-8.5 million, including \$3-3.5 million for CPLG and \$0.5-1.0 million for one-time restructuring costs associated with severances and contract buyouts in achieving the Company's remaining synergies related to the Cookie Jar Acquisition. The Company's go forward quarterly SG&A target is \$7.0-7.5 million.

For Fiscal 2013, amortization of all categories (below the line excluding amortization of film and television and amortization of book value of DHX Cookie Jar acquired library) and development expense when considered together are expected to be in the range of \$6.5-7.0 million (including an estimated \$2.5 million for amortization of intangibles related to Cookie Jar Acquisition). For Fiscal 2013, share-based compensation and other expenses are expected to be in the following ranges respectively: \$1-1.5 million and \$0.25-0.50 million. For Q4 2013, as a result of the new Credit Facilities, finance expense is expected to range from \$0.6-0.8 million.

Update on Cookie Jar Integration

The Cookie Jar Acquisition was completed on October 22, 2012 and Management immediately began to implement its integration plan. The Company completed the integration of all staff located in Toronto into the DHX offices and has sublet the former Cookie Jar Toronto offices for the remaining three year term. The Company has also integrated three offices in California into a central office located in Sherman Oaks and has terminated the former Cookie Jar office lease in Burbank, effective March 31, 2013. Management is pleased to report that the Company, having exceeded the previous target of \$8.0 million by 25%, has now achieved the \$10.0 million in run rate synergy target.

Synergies are generally comprised of the following:

- Workforce harmonization savings of \$8.0 million;
- Lease savings of \$0.8 million;
- Information technology (“IT”) savings of \$0.25 million;
- Travel, general and office savings of \$0.5 million;
- Marketing and trade show costs savings of \$0.25 million; and
- Insurance and administration savings of \$0.2 million.

Timing of the synergies noted above is as follows:

- The workforce, IT, lease terminations, insurance, and administration changes have been communicated and implemented and are anticipated to largely take effect by June 30, 2013;
- The remaining changes for travel and marketing are related to policy changes and efficiencies and are also expected to take full effect by June 30, 2013.

Restructuring costs associated with achieving the savings are expected to total approximately \$4.25-4.75 million. Actual costs and costs to be incurred on quarterly basis are as follows:

- Q1 & Q2 2013 actuals - \$2.0 million
- Q3 2013 actuals - \$1.50 million
- Q4 2013 expected - \$0.75-1.25 million.

CPLG

During the 3rd quarter, the Company appointed Peter Byrne as the new CEO of CPLG. Peter joins CPLG with a wealth of industry experience in worldwide consumer products, having held many senior roles during his career including EVP Consumer Products at HIT Entertainment, EVP Worldwide Licensing and Merchandising at 20th Century Fox, VP Northern Europe for Sara Lee Branded Apparel and General Manager for Fruit of the Loom. Most recently, Peter ran his own global licensing consultancy working with clients such as Guinness World Records, Aardman Animations and Jazeera Children's Channel.

The Company is making significant investments in its wholly owned European licensing company, CPLG, headquartered in London. CPLG is reinvesting in new IT systems and infrastructure to improve efficiency and effectiveness of its sales and administrative teams. CPLG has a renowned reputation in the licensing business, managing the licensing and merchandising for some of the leading entertainment, sports and consumer goods brands.

Sale of Non-Core Building

On February 28, 2013, the Company closed the sale of its building in Halifax, Nova Scotia, as Management deemed it to be a non-core asset. The Company received gross proceeds of \$5.30 million less costs of \$0.09 million, representing a gain of \$1.08 million. The Company executed a 2 year lease for the Halifax offices with the new owners.

Cookie Jar Acquisition

On October 22, 2012, the Company announced the closing of the acquisition of the business of Cookie Jar Entertainment (“**Cookie Jar**”) pursuant to the share purchase agreement entered into on August 20, 2012. The consideration for the Cookie Jar Acquisition was made up of a combination of approximately 36 million shares, \$5.0 million cash, and the assumption of approximately \$65.5 million of debt.

The Cookie Jar Acquisition has significantly strengthened DHX’s industry position in television production and distribution, interactive content and entertainment licensing. Cookie Jar is one of the industry’s leaders in the creation, production and marketing of animated and live-action programming. Its library of nearly 6,000 half-hour episodes of television features some of the world’s most recognizable children’s series including *Richard Scarry’s Busytown Mysteries*, *Caillou*, *The Doodlebops*, *Inspector Gadget* and *Johnny Test*. Cookie Jar programmes Cookie Jar TV, the weekend morning block on CBS. CPLG, Cookie Jar’s full-service international licensing agency, represents numerous entertainment, sport and design brands such as *Strawberry Shortcake*, *Richard Scarry*, *St. Andrews Links* and *Skylanders*.

DHX expects that the combination of DHX and Cookie Jar libraries, and expertise in licensing and distribution that both companies have developed, will provide significant advantages to the combined company for the benefit of DHX’s business and Shareholders. These advantages include:

- significantly strengthened capabilities in the rapidly growing digital segment;
- broadened relationships with distributors including Amazon, Comcast, DISH, Hulu, Netflix, Samsung, Telmex and Vivendi;
- creation of substantial scale with the addition of Cookie Jar’s \$48.27 million in revenue per the audited financial statements for the year ended August 31, 2012 (for further details, please see Schedule A of the Business Acquisition Report filed on www.sedar.com on December 21, 2012);
- greater diversification of revenue streams across operating segments with a greater proportion of revenue derived from higher margin segments;
- combination of two portfolios of globally recognized brands that can be seen in approximately 160 countries;
- increase to content library of children’s programming by a factor of more than three times, from approximately 2,550 to approximately 8,550 half-hour episodes;
- expanded global merchandising opportunities and licensing capabilities for DHX’s owned properties as well as third-party brand management and licensing opportunities;
- ability to programme Cookie Jar TV on the CBS network in the United States on Saturday mornings;
- significant cost synergies, currently estimated to be \$10 million annually (up from \$8 million previously reported), leading to greater fixed cost coverage and margins;
- improved market position and negotiating strength; and
- increased market capitalization may increase potential investor audience and potential for improved liquidity in shares.

Offering

On October 3, 2012, the Company announced the closing of its previously announced public offering of 13,002,000 subscription receipts (“**the Subscription Receipts**”) after full exercise of the underwriter’s overallotment option, at a price of \$1.50 per subscription receipt (the “**Offering**”). The net proceeds of \$18.29 million from the Offering (after deducting the underwriters’ fees and Offering expenses of \$1.21 million) were used to reduce indebtedness resulting from the Cookie Jar Acquisition.

Sale of Interest in Tribal Nova

Subsequent to March 31, 2013, on April 11, 2013, the Company completed the sale of its interest in Tribal Nova for net proceeds of \$1.73 million, representing a gain of \$0.32 million.

Seasonality

Results of operations for any period are dependent on the number and timing of film and television programs delivered, which cannot be predicted with certainty. Consequently, the Company's results from operations may fluctuate materially from period-to-period and the results of any one period are not necessarily indicative of results for future periods. Cash flows may also fluctuate and are not necessarily closely correlated with revenue recognition. During the initial broadcast of the rights the Company is somewhat reliant on the broadcaster's budget and financing cycles and at times the license period gets delayed and commences at a later date than originally projected.

The Company's film and television revenues vary significantly from quarter to quarter driven by contracted deliveries with the primary broadcasters. Although with the Company's recent diversification of its revenue mix, particularly in the strengthening of the distribution revenue stream, some of the quarterly unevenness is improving slightly and becoming more predictable. Distribution revenues are contract and demand driven and can fluctuate significantly from period-to-period.

Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires Management to make estimates, judgements, and assumptions that Management believes are reasonable based upon the information available. These estimates, judgements, and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting year or period. Actual results can differ from those estimates (refer to page 2 of this MD&A for more information regarding forward-looking information). For a discussion of all of the Company's accounting policies, refer to note 3 of the audited consolidated financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 on www.sedar.com or DHX's website at www.dhxmedia.com.

Future Accounting Standard Changes

The IASB has issued IFRS 10, 11, 12, and 13 effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2013. The IASB has also issued IFRS 9 effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2015, with early adoption permitted. IFRS 9 introduces new classification and measurement requirements for financial instruments. IFRS 10 defines the principles of control and establishes the basis of when and how an entity should be included within a set of consolidated financial statements. IFRS 11, *Joint Ventures* – establishes principles to determine the type of joint arrangement and guidance for financial reporting activities required by the entities that have an interest in arrangements which are controlled jointly. IFRS 12, *Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities* – requires extensive disclosures relating to a company's interest in subsidiaries, joint arrangements, associates, and unconsolidated structured entities. IFRS 13, *Fair Value Measurement* – defines fair value, provides guidance in a single framework for measuring fair value and identifies the required disclosures pertaining to fair value measurement. DHX continues to assess the impact of IFRS 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 on its consolidated statement of operations and financial position.

Financial Instruments and Risk Management

The Company's financial instruments consist of cash, restricted cash, short-term investments, amounts receivable, long-term investment, bank indebtedness, interim production financing, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, long-term debt and obligations under capital leases, and the other liability. The Company, through its financial assets and liabilities, has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments: credit risk, interest rate risk, liquidity risk, and currency risk. Management monitors risk levels and reviews risk management activities as they determine to be necessary.

Credit Risk

Amounts receivable from the Canadian federal government and other government agencies in connection with production financing represents 47% of total amounts receivable at March 31, 2013 (June 30, 2012 - 62%). Certain of these amounts are subject to audit by the government agencies. The Company adjusts amounts receivable from Canadian federal government and other government agencies including federal and provincial tax credits receivables in connection with production financing, quarterly and annually for any known differences arising from internal or external audit of these amounts.

The balance of trade amounts receivable are primarily with Canadian broadcasters and large international distribution companies. The Company has recorded an allowance for doubtful accounts of less than 1% against the gross amounts of trade receivables, and management believes that the net amount of trade receivables is fully collectible.

Interest Rate Risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk arising from fluctuations in interest rates as its interim production financing, certain long-term debt, and a portion of cash bear interest at floating rates. A 1% fluctuation would have an approximate \$0.75-1.00 million effect on annual net income (loss).

Liquidity Risk

The Company manages liquidity by forecasting and monitoring operating cash flows and through the use of capital leases and revolving credit facilities (see note 14 of the audited consolidated financial statements for June 30, 2012 for further details). As at March 31, 2013 the Company had cash on hand of \$20.28 million (June 30, 2012 - \$19.17 million) and no short-term investments (June 30, 2012 - \$3.32 million in Canadian government grade bonds).

Currency Risk

The Company's activities which expose it to currency risk involve the holding of foreign currencies as well as incurring production costs and earning revenues that are denominated in foreign currencies. For every 1% change in the USD, GBP, or Euros exchange rate versus the Canadian dollar would be less than a \$0.30 million impact on net income (loss) and minimal effect on balance sheet items.

Risk Assessment

The following are the specific and general risks that could affect the Company that each reader should carefully consider. Additional risks and uncertainties not presently known to the Company or that the Company does not currently anticipate will be material, may impair the Company's business operations and its operating results and as a result could materially impact its business, results of operations, prospects, and financial condition. These specific and general risks are as follows: risks related to the nature of the entertainment industry, risks related to television and film industries, risks related to doing business internationally, loss of Canadian status, competition, limited ability to exploit filmed and television content library, protecting and defending against intellectual property claims, fluctuating results of operations, raising additional capital, concentration risk, reliance on key personnel, market share price fluctuations, risks associated with acquisitions and joint ventures, potential for budget overruns and other production risks, management estimates in revenues and earnings, stoppage of incentive programs, financial risks resulting from the Company's capital requirements, government incentive program, change in regulatory environment, litigation, technological change, labour relations, and exchange rates. *For further details see "Risk Factors" contained in the Company's 2012 Annual MD&A on www.sedar.com or DHX's website at www.dhxmedia.com.*

Disclosure Controls and Procedures and Internal Control over Financial Reporting

The Company's Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") and Chief Financial Officer ("CFO") have designed or caused to be designed under their supervision, disclosure controls and procedures to provide reasonable assurance that material information is gathered and reported to senior management to permit timely decisions regarding public disclosure and to provide reasonable assurance that the information required to be disclosed in reports that are filed or submitted under Canadian securities legislation is recorded, processed, summarized, and reported within the time period specified in those rules.

The CEO and the CFO have also designed, or caused to be designed under their supervision, internal controls over financial reporting to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of financial reporting and the preparation of financial statements for external purposes.

In its annual filings dated September 28, 2012, the CEO and the CFO, after evaluating the effectiveness of the Company's disclosure controls and procedures, and internal control over financial reporting, concluded that as at June 30, 2012, both the Company's disclosure controls and procedures, and internal control over financial reporting were operating effectively. It should be noted that a control system, no matter how well conceived and operated, can provide only reasonable, not absolute, assurance that the objectives of the control system are met. Because of the inherent limitations in all control systems, no evaluation of controls can provide absolute assurance that all control issues, including instances of fraud, if any, have been detected.

There were no changes in internal controls over financial reporting during the three months ended March 31, 2013 that have materially affected, or are reasonably likely to materially affect, the Company's internal controls over financial reporting.

Use of Non-GAAP Financial Measures

In addition to the results reported in accordance with IFRS or GAAP, the Company uses various non-GAAP financial measures, which are not recognized under IFRS or GAAP, as supplemental indicators of our operating performance and financial position. These non-GAAP financial measures are provided to enhance the user's understanding of our historical and current financial performance and our prospects for the future. Management believes that these measures provide useful information in that they exclude amounts that are not indicative of our core operating results and ongoing operations and provide a more consistent basis for comparison between periods. The following discussion explains the Company's use of EBITDA, Adjusted EBITDA, Gross Margin, and Adjusted Operating Activities as measures of performance.

“**EBITDA**” means earnings (loss) before interest, taxes, depreciation, amortization, share-based compensation expense, finance expense (income), share of loss of associates, development expense, and impairment of certain investments in film and television programs; and “**Adjusted EBITDA**” also includes adjustments for other one-time charges. Amortization includes amortization of PP&E, acquired libraries, and intangible assets. EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA are not earnings measures recognized by GAAP and do not have a standardized meaning prescribed by GAAP. Therefore, EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA may not be comparable to similar measures presented by other issuers. Management believes EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA to be meaningful indicators of our performance that provides useful information to investors regarding our financial condition and results of operation.

“**Gross Margin**” means revenue less direct production costs and amortization of film and television programs produced and new for Q2 2013 onward, less amortization of the book value of the DHX Cookie Jar acquired library. Gross Margin is not an earnings measure recognized by GAAP and does not have a standardized meaning prescribed by GAAP. Therefore, Gross Margin may not be comparable to similar measures presented by other issuers.

“**Adjusted Operating Activities**” is a non-GAAP financial measure of cash inflows and outflows from operating activities adjusted for increases and decreases in interim production financing and one-time charges (including CJ One-time Charges), as in Management’s opinion, these are also an integral part of determining cash flows from operations. Adjusted Operating Activities is one of the key cash flow measurement tools used by Management in assessing cash flow performance.

A reconciliation of historical results to EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA is presented on the next page.

Reconciliation of Historical Results to EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA

EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA are not recognized earnings measures under GAAP and do not have standardized meanings prescribed by GAAP. Therefore EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA may not be comparable to similar measures presented by other companies or issuers. Investors are cautioned that EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA should not be construed as alternatives to net income or loss determined in accordance with GAAP as an indicator of the Company's performance or to cash flows from operating, investing, and financing activities as a measure of liquidity and cash flows. The following table reconciles income (loss) before income taxes, EBITDA and Adjusted EBITDA, and Gross Margin, based on the unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements for the three and nine months ended March 31, 2013 and 2012 of the Company found on www.sedar.com and www.dhxmedia.com.
